A notarization is the formal process of having a document certified by a Notary Publica state-authorized official tasked with preventing fraud. The notary acts as an impartial witness to ensure that:

- The person signing the document is who they say they are
- They are signing willingly and are of sound mind
- The document is legitimate and hasnt been tampered with


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There are several types of notarizations:

- **Acknowledgment:** Used when you need to confirm you signed a document voluntarily.
- Oath or Affirmation: A spoken promise to tell the truth, often used in affidavits.

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Each type of notarization serves a unique legal purpose, and your notary will help ensure the correct one is used.



What You Need to Bring

Proper preparation saves time and ensures your notarization is valid. Here's what youll need:

- A valid government-issued ID such as a driver's license, passport, or military ID. It must be current and not expired.
- The document to be notarized, preferably unsigned. Most notarizations require that you sign in front of the notary.
- Witnesses, if your document requires them. Be sure to confirm this ahead of time, as notaries often cannot serve as a witness themselves.

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Additional Tips:

- Review your document for blank spaces. Many notaries will not proceed if the document is incomplete.
- If youre unsure about which type of notarization you need, consult the document provider or a legal professional, as notaries are not permitted to provide legal advice.

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Common Documents That Need a Notary

What Happens During a Notarization?

- Signing the Document: You sign the document in front of the notary. If an oath is required, youll be asked to verbally affirm the truthfulness of the contents.
- Journal Entry: The notary records the details of the transaction in their official journal.
- Applying the Notarial Seal: The notary stamps and signs the document to certify its authenticity.

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The whole process usually takes just a few minutes if youre properly prepared.



Avoid These Common Mistakes

Its easy to make small mistakes that could invalidate your notarization. Heres what to avoid:

- Signing too early: Most notarizations require that the document be signed in the notarys presence.
- Bringing an expired ID: Even a day past expiration, your ID may be rejected.
- Leaving blank sections: Incomplete documents are a red flag for fraud.
- Forgetting required witnesses: If your document requires witnesses, bring them with you.
- Requesting legal advice: Notaries are not allowed to interpret or explain documents doing so could be considered unauthorized legal practice.

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Double-check your document and ID before your appointment to avoid delays.
